## District Adopts 2016-2017 Budget

The Ferndale Area School Board adopted the 2016-2017 fiscal year budget on June 15, 2016. Real estate millage was set at 78 mills, which was an increase of 2.8 mills. After review, the Pennsylvania Department of Education approved the tax rate. The increase was less than the 2016-2017 index of 3.8\% which was required by Act 1 participating districts.


The Ferndale Area School District Board of Directors meets on the third Wednesday of each month in the Elementary School Board Room at 6:00 p.m. except for the months of May and December, unless otherwise advertised. Meetings are not scheduled for the month of July.

# From the Desk of the Junior-Senior High School Principalls...

I arrived just in time to be a part of the PSSA Mathematics for both 7th and 8th graders, as well as PSSA Science for the 8th graders the following week. With a few weeks of respite from testing, the staff and faculty were busy working on their coursework and preparing for the end of the school year. April being concluded with testing brought May which brought another round of testing modules to the building. Ms. Livesey's AP English students demonstrated their mastery of the course content through the AP English Exam, while Mr. Lasko's students likewise demonstrated their proficiency on the AP History Exam. Meanwhile, on May 4, ten students and Mr. Dan Endler attended the SuperConference 23 at Mount Aloysius College. SuperConference is a leadership conference involving many local schools in an effort to elicit those leadership qualities from the students.

The National Honor Society was held on May 4 and the Induction Ceremony was well received by all in attendance. Mr. Rainey's choir and band students performed for a packed house with classical and contemporary selections that had quite a few toes tapping, including my own, and a few audience members singing along with the performers. Additionally, the 6th Grade Orientation was held on May 10, giving the incoming 7th graders a chance to orient themselves with the school and prepare for their transition from elementary to junior high school.

## Senior Exit Survey Resullts

For the past couple years, during graduation practice, seniors have taken an exit survey. Questions on the survey are meant to provide information about services, programs, and preparedness for life after graduation. Following are some results of this year's survey:

- $26 \%$ will continue schooling at a 2 year college or trade school
- $46 \%$ will continue schooling at a 4 year college
- $20 \%$ will enter the job market
- $9 \%$ are entering the military
- $91 \%$ report getting their 1 st choice in what they want to do after graduation
- $85 \%$ felt supported and respected by their teachers and principals
- $72 \%$ felt safe and secure at school
- $91 \%$ felt their time at school was well spent
- $35 \%$ said if we could get rid of just a few people (bullies), our school climate would be much better
- $37 \%$ felt the discipline policy needs updated/some revisions

We are doing a great job, but there is always room for improvements, as the survey results indicate.
