### Code of Conduct for Board Members

The Ferndale Area Board of Directors approved the adoption of the Pennsylvania School Boards Association's (PSBA) recommended Standards for Effective School Governance and the Code of Conduct for Members of Pennsylvania School Boards.

The standards and code, adopted by the PSBA Executive Board in

September 2005, are designed to give school board members specific guidance on providing the essential leadership required for highly effective boards. Based on the premise that highly achieving students come from districts with highly effective boards, PSBA

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# Students Against Destructive Decisions

This January, Ferndale Area started a SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions) Chapter for grades 7-12. The purpose of SADD is to provide student involvement into school activities that encourage positive behaviors and interactions for the students and their peers. The goal of SADD is to create a bridge that connects the elementary school, middle school, high school, staff, parents, and community that will

help everybody as a whole make better decisions. There are currently 36 members and 8 advisors. In order to get started and put ideas into effect, students raised money through bake sales, concession stands, local businesses donations, and a dodge ball tournament. To promote their cause, students designed tee-shirts for SADD members.

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### Student Wellness Policy

The Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act, Public Law 108-265, requires every school district that receives federal funds for food service programs to adopt a Wellness Policy. The adopted Student Wellness Policy must be submitted to the Pennsylvania Department of Education July 1, 2006.

The policy, adopted by the Board of School Directors on April 19, 2006, was developed by a Wellness Committee appointed by the Board. The committee, comprised of representatives of the school board, district administration, school food authority, students, parents/ guardians, and the public, created a plan that includes the following required components:

- Goals for nutrition education. physical education, and other school-based activities that are designed to promote student wellness in a manner that the local school district determines is appropriate.
- Nutrition guidelines selected by the school district for all foods available on each school campus under the district during the school day with objectives for promoting student health and reducing childhood obesity.
  - A plan for measuring implementation of the wellness policy, including

### District Adopts 2006-07 Budget

The Ferndale Area School Board adopted the 2006-07 Fiscal Year Budget on June 14, 2006. Real estate millage was set at 53 mills, which was an increase of 2.5 mills. After review, the Pennsylvania Department of Education approved the tax rate. The increase was less than the 2006-07 index of 5.9% which was required by Act 72 participating districts.

# Ferndale Area School District Receives AYP Recognition

The Pennsylvania Department of Education has honored both Ferndale Area Elementary School and

Ferndale Area Junior/Senior High School with an award for meeting the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) standards for two consecutive years.

The keystone-shaped award is being awarded to schools across the state where the students have exceeded the math and reading standards required by the state's accountability system and the federal No Child Left Behind Act.

To meet AYP in the 2003-2004 school year, 35 percent of students needed to be considered proficient in math and

45 percent proficient in reading. For the 2004-2005 and the current school year, proficiency standards were

raised to 45 percent in math and 54 percent in reading. FASD is receiving its second Keystone Achievement Award for its high achieving students. The teachers, school staff, parents, community and students have worked hard to achieve at this level.

This is the second year that the Pennsylvania Department of Education and the Pennsylvania Association of Federal Program Coordinators have partnered to create the Keystone Achievement Award. Statewide, 2234 schools

received this award and 1567 received the award for the second time.

The PSBA Standard for Effective School Governance highlights six areas of performance by school boards that promote effective student growth and achievement:

- Advocates for a thorough and efficient system of public education.
- 2. Models responsible governance and leadership.
- Govern through policy.
- Ensures that effective planning occurs.
- Monitors results.
- Communicates with and engages the community.

PSBA's Code of Conduct details expectations for board member behavior. Adoption of the code of conduct is voluntary for any school board or director. However, the association believes that these guiding principles are important to maintaining an efficient and respected board that is committed to student excellence.

The Standards for Effective School Governance and Code of Conduct were adopted unanimously by the Ferndale Area Board of School Directors on January 25, 2006.

# Adventures in Biotechnology

This year a group of juniors, Richard Henry, Kristina Stroscio, Kylee Taylor, Sara Smith, Kayla Smith, and Jessica Jung, participated in the program Adventures in Biotechnology, an eight-week working partnership between a team of students from a southwestern Pennsylvania high school and a biotech business or industry. The project provides high school juniors and seniors the opportunity to enhance their academic and technical skills by working directly with company employees to identify and solve business issues; design and build a product; or re-engineer an existing product, process or system. The project utilizes leadership, support, communication, and accountability strategies in order to increase the academic, technical, and business skills of students in a work-based environment.

Our group of students worked with ITSI Bio in Richland Township to develop a marketing plan for their products. At the end of the project, the students attended the 2006 Regenerate World Congress in Pittsburgh, PA. At the conference, students saw cutting edge research projects from college students and professors in the field of tissue engineering. The students also toured the McGowan Institute for Regenerative Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh.

# **Reading Treasures**

The elementary school is getting ready for a new reading series for the 2006-07 school year! The staff adopted Macmillan/McGraw-Hill's *Treasures*. The series is a balance of rich motivating fiction and engaging content area text. The students will be using a variety of effective manipulatives to help increase their achievement. *Treasures* will also be bringing us wonderful new big books for K-3.

This year, the first through sixth grade students will also be exposed to Guided Reading through our adoption of *iOpeners* from the Pearson Learning Group. *iOpeners* brings science and social studies topics to life, raises student achievement in reading, and boosts standardized test scores. It equips students with the skills and strategies they need to access and comprehend nonfiction, so that they are not only learning to read but reading to learn. Our K4 and kindergarten students will be exposed to Guided Reading through Pearson's *Ready Readers*.

This will help our students build a body of word study skills beginning readers need to access text. *Ready Readers* uses a variety of genres, including fiction, nonfiction, fantasy, and realistic fiction. It ensures that children read, not memorize, the text as they successfully progress through the stages. We are looking forward to an exciting new year with this new series!

# Science Explorer

Students at the Junior/Senior High School will be seeing some changes in the area of science education when they return to school in the fall. Following a year long review of science standards and materials, the teachers in the science department have recommended the purchase of new textbooks for grades 7, 8, 9, and Biology. All materials are published by Prentice Hall and support the Pennsylvania State Science Standards.

In grades 7 and 8, a new module-based program, Prentice Hall Science Explorer, has been adopted. Students in grade 7 will utilize 4 modules: Animals, Cells and Heredity, Environmental Science, and Magnetism. Students in grade 8 will receive instruction in Inside Earth, Earth's Changing Surface, Earth's Water, and Weather and Climate. Grade 6 students will begin transitioning into the new program during the second semester. They will be utilizing 2 modules: Astronomy, and Bacteria to Plants.

The Integrated Science and Biology courses will also utilize new programs. The new textbooks have an excellent emphasis on differentiating instruction for various learning styles and levels. Both programs also provide outstanding technological support for teachers and students.

# **TEAMS Project**

SCIENCE FAIR

This year, we were fortunate to yet again have the wonderful opportunity to participate in the IU8

TEAMS project (Teaming Educators for Applied Math and Science). The purpose of the TEAMS grant is to improve the content knowledge of teachers, which can translate to student achievement in science. Through our partnership with the IU8 and St. Francis, we were able to continue the eighth grade stream survey as well as develop a new unit for the seventh grade which illustrated the effects and dangers of alcohol and drug abuse on the human body, more specifically adolescents' bodies.

The 2005-2006 school year was the second of a three-year grant provided by

Title II. During the summer institute hosted by St. Francis, we learned about the mechanics of wind energy, even having an opportunity to participate in a

science fair. Unfortunately, we didn't win the coveted Torvian Dining Hall no-bake cookies, but we had a great time designing our windmill.

The coming year is the final year of the grant as well as the summer institute at St. Francis. Over the two week session during the summer, the group, Ron Wilson, Chris Theys, Stephanie Mino, Janice Cowder, Amanda Williamson, and Cristian Evans, will work on developing lessons across the curriculum in conjunction with the St. Francis staff. The school will also receive \$5,000 in FOSS (Full Option Science System) kits as well as an additional \$5,000 to develop a learning lab in the elementary or middle school. As part of this learning experience, students and staff from St.


Francis will be visiting the elementary and middle schools one or two times a month to co-teach the developed lessons from the summer institute.


# Laurel Wood Pep Rally


