## PAWS for Reading

Ferndale Area Elementary School took part in the One School, One Book program for the second year in a row with Fenway and Hattie, by Victoria J. Coe. One School, One Book creates a shared reading experience across our elementary school community. Fenway and Hattie is an adorable book told through the eyes of a small, energetic Jack Russell Terrier, who faces many challenges when his family moves from the city to the suburbs.

## District Adopts 2023-2024 Budget

The Ferndale Area School Board adopted the 20232024 fiscal year budget on May 24, 2023. Real estate millage was set at 96.5 mills, which was an increase of 3.5 mills. After review, the Pennsylvania Department of Education approved the tax rate. The increase was less than the 2023-2024 index of $6.4 \%$ which was required by Act 1 participating districts.

The Ferndale Area School District Board of Directors Board Workshop Meetings are held on the third Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. and Voting Board Meetings are held on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. except for the months of April, June, November, and December, unless otherwise advertised. Meetings are not scheduled for the month of July. Meetings are held in the Elementary School Board Room.

## Innovation in the Hive

Third and fourth grade students in our afterschool STEAM (Lego Explores) program dove into Lego exploration during the months of January, February, and March with Mrs. Sendek and Miss Potasnik. During earlier meetings, students were introduced to the First Lego League competition requirements which included Robot Design, Robot Game, Core Values, and the Innovation Project that our fifth and sixth grade team completed at competition back in February. At each meeting, students
completed a team-building activity and had a chance to complete a building challenge project from a Lego Bingo card to work their way towards a final prize. They also had the chance to create their own leprechaun trap and hold a boat race building challenge. Students tested their Lego boat prototype in water to see if it could successfully float. Our Lego Explores students had so much fun refining their engineering skills! Thank you for a great year!


## LEGO League Challlenge

FIRST LEGO League Challenge is an international program and competition for elementary and middle school-aged children. Each year in August, the theme for the year is released to the participating groups. Students are immersed in research, problem -solving, coding, and engineering that will engage them in a range of rigorous and relevant learning experiences. Students develop an innovative solution to a realworld problem and design, build, and code a LEGO robot to solve themed challenge missions.
The PA Central First Lego League Championship is the annual regional competition hosted by the Appalachia Intermediate Unit 8 for grades 4-8 (ages 916) in our area. The grand winner from this competition has the opportunity to compete on a larger scale at the state championship and later the world festival if they move up in the ranks. Areas that the teams are scored in by a judging panel include Robot Design, Robot Game, Core Values, and Innovation Project. Ferndale Area Elementary's Lego League team for the 2022-2023 season was coached by Miss Potasnik and Mrs. Sendek. The team hit the ground running and
worked tirelessly on each of the various aspects needed to compete. This year, the competition was held in February at Altoona Area Junior High School.
Jacket Power competed against 30 schools and private groups in our area. They had three separate robot game rounds where they had to complete as many missions as they could with their robot in a 2.5 -minute window to earn points. In addition, the group had a 30-minute presentation round where they had to talk with the judges about an innovation/research project that they conducted based on the theme. The team worked so hard this season and really exemplified teamwork throughout the experience. Our Yellow Jacket team won the hearts of the judges and crowd by showing their sense of Jacket Pride and teamwork. As a result, they brought back a 3rd place trophy for the Core Values category to The Hive and had a super clean final robot game. ## Building Math Minds

Throughout the school year, many students have a chance to build their math skills by opening an app called First in Math on their iPads. This program engages students by way of math games in order to strengthen their mathematical abilities and foundations. The program is self-driven.....meaning that the student gets to choose whether or not they use it throughout their school day. Many students participate everyday earning stickers to build their sticker count and advance on the First in Math Wall that is displayed in the elementary school first floor hallway as students enter the building. Each week, students are added onto the wall (starting at 1,000 stickers) or progressing through 8 categories from Math Whiz to Grand Champion. Their names were announced each week, and certificates were issued as they progressed through the program. You may have even seen their pictures posted on the Ferndale Area Facebook page each week. This year we are proud to have 29 students reach the top 3 levels.

Over three hundred students took the stage at Ferndale Area Elementary School's Fernstock performance on Friday, May 19. Created by Mrs. Jill Vuckovich in 1994, Fernstock continues as a longstanding tradition that is loved by both past and present Ferndale students.
Elementary General Music teacher, Mrs. Melanie Engel, currently works with all students in grades PreK through sixth grade. To prepare for this program, each class learned and rehearsed a routine that they later performed for their friends and family. Fernstock teaches students many aspects of music and performance; they learn how to be good performers as well as good audience members. This year's program was titled "Music of the Decades," which featured many classic past and current hits, from the Beatles 60's hit "Yellow Submarine" to the 2010 Bruno Mars’ favorite "Count on Me."
